

Growing in Monmouth County AMIB's 19th and 20th Homes

arlier in the year AMIB procured two additional residential sites in Monmouth County to serve as our 19th and 20th group homes once we incorporate accessible design and renovations to meet the variety of needs for the visually impaired/blind and disabled residents prior move in. This milestone builds on the success of our 18 group homes up to this point and we will be helping eight new residents and families of New Jersey with 24/7 direct care residential, medical and behavioral supports.

The Green Tree section of Freehold Township is a welcoming residential community known for its pleasant neighborhood, supporting a variety of pear, oak and maple trees, street lighted sidewalks, parks, CentraState Medical Center hospital and therapeutic services. Being within proximity to two of AMIB's other group homes in Freehold Township, we can share resources, staff and grow our in-house party invitation lists, facilitating the transition of the new to be residents.

The Kepwell Park section of Ocean Township is another bustling neighborhood that blends quiet suburban living with access to recreation, shopping, and community services. This setting provides our residents with opportunities to enjoy a safe, family-oriented environment, and easy transportation connections make it an ideal location for AMIB residents to engage fully in Monmouth County community life. It will be our first group home in this township.

The expansions of these homes reflect AMIB's dedication to our mission of inclusivity and empowerment. 



AMIB Individuals Enjoy Inclusive Opportunities at RWJ Barnabas Health Field of Dreams

ometimes all it takes to get an idea off the ground is a hometown connection. For Christian Kane of Toms River, that connection was former MLB All-Star Todd Frazier. Together, they helped bring Kane's vision of an inclusive recreation space to life: The RWJBarnabas Health Field of Dreams.

This one-of-a-kind complex was designed for children and adults with special needs to enjoy sports, play, and community in a safe and a welcoming environment. Inspired by Kane's son Gavin, who suffered a traumatic brain injury in 2012, the project grew from the simple idea of building a baseball field to a \$3.6 million inclusive complex featuring a playground, basketball courts, and more.

The complex officially opened on April 30, 2022 with nearly 500 guests in attendance. Gavin threw out the first pitch to Frazier, marking a memory of years in the making.

At **AMIB**, we are inspired by projects like the *Field of Dreams* that open doors to inclusion and belonging. Our **AMIB** individuals love to visit the *Field of Dreams* and enjoy using its facilities. The Association for the Multiple Impaired Blind, Inc. (**AMIB**)'s mission is to promote community integration and participation of people who are blind or visually impaired and have multiple impairments by providing opportunities for community living, training, and support. The individuals we serve, had a day out and about at *The Field of Dreams*.

AMIB operates under the principle that each individual, regardless of their disabilities, was created as a unique person with the right to enjoy experiences while living within a community, the right to responsibility, and the right to contribute to the richness and fullness of our society. We are dedicated to ensuring that the people we serve are given the opportunity for full inclusion.


